One mechanism of local government — why the number needed to meet and to pass a measure is a rule, not a guess, and how vacancies and abstentions change it.

How This Guide Works

This is part of **Incognati Civics**, applying the field-guide format to local government — city councils, counties, special districts, zoning, and local taxes. Unlike elections or federal law, local structure **varies by state and even by town**: the same title can carry different powers ten miles away. So each specimen names the pattern and the tell, then points you to the one authority that settles it — your own jurisdiction's charter and your state's code — rather than asserting a single national rule. Sources are cross-jurisdiction bodies and representative statutes, listed in full on the references page.

Quorum & What a Majority Means

Quot Sufficiunt

Governing precedent / case Quorum and voting rules (varies by body) **Status** Varies by body; structured

OBSERVED SPECIMEN	COUNCILS, BOARDS, AND COMMISSIONS
<i>A body cannot act without a quorum — usually a majority of its full membership, present to do business. Passing a measure then may require a majority of those present, a majority of the full membership, or a supermajority for certain acts (budgets, zoning, emergencies). Vacancies, abstentions, and recusals shift the math: with seats empty, “a majority of the whole” can be more than a majority of those in the room, and an abstention can function as a no. “It passed” or “it failed on a tie” depends on which rule the body uses, spelled out in its charter or adopted procedure.</i>	

THE HOOK	THE MECHANISM
‘Majority’ sounds obvious, so people assume half-the-room-plus-one always carries.	Quorum and passage thresholds are set by charter or rules and can require a majority of the full body, not just those present; vacancies, abstentions, and recusals change the denominator.

Field mark: when a vote passes or fails narrowly, check whether the threshold is a majority of those present or of the full membership, and how abstentions count — the body's charter or adopted rules define it.

Reading a Close Vote: A Gut Check

four questions before ‘it passed’ or ‘it tied’ is the whole story

- 1 Confirm the quorum**
A body cannot legally act without the required number present.
- 2 Identify the threshold**
Majority of those present, or of the full membership?
- 3 Count vacancies**
Empty seats can raise the number needed to pass.
- 4 Know how abstentions count**
An abstention may effectively be a no.
